



# Effectiveness and Urgency of Regulation in Smart Government and Digital Public Services

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## Abstract

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Digital transformation in government has spurred the emergence of the concept of smart government as an effort to improve the quality of public services, making them more effective, efficient, transparent, and participatory. This study aims to analyze the effectiveness of regulations in supporting the implementation of smart government and to examine the urgency of regulations in the face of rapid technological developments. The research method employed is a normative legal approach using legislative and conceptual frameworks, through an analysis of various regulations relevant to public services and information technology. ## **1. Introduction**

The formulation of the research questions in this study is:

**RQ2:** Why are regulations related to smart government and technology-based public services important to be studied in the context of the development of government digitalization?

## 2. Methods

This research uses a normative juridical method that focuses on the analysis of legal norms related to the implementation of technology-based government, especially in the context of smart government and public services. This approach was chosen because the research does not aim to examine empirical phenomena directly in the field, but rather to examine and analyze the applicable legal provisions and how these norms are interpreted in supporting the digital transformation of government. The sources of legal materials used in this study consist of primary, secondary, and tertiary legal materials. Secondary legal materials are in the form of scientific literature such as books, journals, and research results that are relevant to the research topic. Meanwhile, tertiary legal materials are used as support, such as legal dictionaries and encyclopedias that help in understanding the terms used in research. The collection of legal materials is carried out through literature studies by tracing various credible and relevant literature sources.

The analysis technique used in this study is qualitative analysis with descriptive-analytical methods. Descriptive analysis is carried out by systematically describing the applicable legal provisions as well as concepts related to smart government and public services. Furthermore, an analytical analysis is carried out to assess the effectiveness of existing regulations and identify the weaknesses and strengths of these legal norms in supporting the implementation of technology-based governance. The analysis process is carried out by examining the relationship between legal norms and the concept of smart government and the actual needs in the implementation of public services.

Through this method, the research is expected to provide a comprehensive understanding of how regulations play a role in supporting the digital transformation of government and why these regulations are important to study. In addition, the normative juridical approach allows researchers to identify the gap between existing legal norms and the ideal needs in the implementation of smart government, so that it can contribute to the development of policies that are more adaptive and responsive to technological developments.

### **3. Results and Discussion**
